ASSOCIATION UPDATE

The OJA currently has a steadily increasing membership. It is also undergoing a slow but inexorable metamorphosis. The decor and design of the clubrooms are under review, the future method of funding the OJA and the activities it supports are being examined. The venue for the annual dinner was changed last year, and following on from that success it returns to the Royal Sailors' home club in Queen street. The production of the newsletters has settled down to a more regular regime. By the time you read this, a new and fairly powerful computer system will have been installed in the clubrooms with WIFI broadband access and will have the capacity to administer the newsletter productions and membership database onsite.

An increasingly productive relationship with the College is developing with some interesting potential spinoffs to be announced when appropriate in the future.

With the acquisition of the computer equipment it is hoped to explore the possibilities of tapping into the current student IT skills for the production of the newsletters. This has the dual

benefit of letting the non-digital members of the Committee off the hook and provide the current 6th form with the opportunity to develop their publishing skills and provide another useful entry on the ever-important CV's they are busy constructing at their stage of life. Through the Silver group and its contacts a 6th form visit to the Air Traffic Control Centre at Swanwick was arranged.

We are looking at resurrecting sporting links and activities between the OJA and SJC. The College has excellent facilities and they are keen to resume that friendly rivalry that used to exist between the OJA members and the incumbent students.

Neville grew up in North End, Portsmouth. At the age of 19 he went to Mexico to complete his degree in Spanish and Latin American studies. He has lived in Guatemala for the last 25 years. Currently age 52 and a father of five.

Remembered at SJC for being lead soloist for several years in the productions produced by Helen Dyer.

Some details of surrounding facilities and how to find the venue:-

Queen street is the road that joins the dockyard (Victory) gate (where HMS Victory languishes alongside the Warrior) and St. John's Roman Catholic

cathedral. The Royal sailor's home club is a couple of hundred yards up from the dockyard gate on the right hand side. (Opposite where the old Whitbread brewery used to be.)

This a ten minute walk from the Portsmouth harbour railway station.

Recommended parking is in the Gunwharf underground car park, which is security monitored. Parking charges are suspended overnight so the cost is reasonable. This is just under a 20 minute walk away.

JOHN HARMAN OFFORD

Died aged 82

August 7th1924 - January 25th 2007

John Offord was one of those inspirational teachers who left his mark on generations of OJ's. As one of a triumvirate with Helen Dyer and Ronnie Mills, he played his part in inculcating a love of the performing arts in the pupils of St Johns. John combined, philosophy, history and a sense of the romantic in a unique blend, touching so many of his charges who became his friends. With a mixture of his love of contemporary European drama and studied eccentricity, he brought a real breath of mitteleuropa to Southsea's sounding shores.

Born on the 7th of August 1924 in Southsea, and educated at Portsmouth Grammar School, he was called up in 1942 and joined the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers. Seconded to his beloved Fourth Hussars, he served in North Africa, Italy and Austria between 1943 and 1945

After 1945, John elected to remain a career soldier and over the next twenty-three years he served in places as disparate as India, Cyprus, Düsseldorf and Reading. He finished his service in 1968 as the last commanding officer of Southsea Castle before it was demilitarised in that year.

He gained his degree whilst he was still in the Army, and achieved his teacher's

certificate at Portsmouth Polytechnic (as it then was) after his retirement from service.

St. Johns was his first teaching appointment, and he soon made his mark with a production of "The Long and the Short and the Tall" in 1969 with the benevolent assistance of Brother Swithun. For the first time St. John's sixth formers appeared on stage smoking and swearing in a new "reality".

Many productions followed, including works by Betti, Camus, Chekhov, Dürrenmatt, Pinter, Sartre, Schiller, Shaw and Zuckmayer, during the course of which John combined the talents of staff, friends and pupils in an almost seamless robe, which, for many, was the bridge between boyhood and manhood.

John retired from teaching in 1989, and became a stalwart of the Theatre Royal, of which he remained a Trustee until he died. He wrote a Portsmouth Paper on the history of Theatre in Portsmouth, which is still in print. In his later years he combined his love of spectacle with his love of philosophy in his support for St Agatha's Church Portsea, which was, under its charismatic nineteenth century parish priest, Father Dolling, the model for Compton McKenzie's novel, "The Altar Steps"

John Offord's funeral:-

Those of you who wanted to be there but were unable to make it might want to hear about it.

Like the man, it was very Victorian and not very practical. He had made specific demands, namely no hymns, no Old Testament, reading, no sermon, no eulogy and no wake.

HOWEVER:- it was in a church so high that it needed scaffolding, (bells, smells and beautiful black velvet chasubles with more gold braid than the Lord Chancellor), there was a full funeral mass concelebrated by two priests, a horse drawn bier and a grave in the Highland Road cemetary. The mourners followed the funeral cortege on foot, which you can imagine from Fawcett Road, past his old house and then down Albert Road causing major obstructions everywhere.

Steve Pitt offered everyone the hospitality of the Eastney Cellars. You may be interested to know that Brother Damien (aged 86) actually walked the whole way from Highland Road to Eastney. The man is truly amazing. About 150 mourners were there.

As soon as I received the news I wanted to be there with other people who had known or been influenced by John Offord. He meant a lot to me.

There are very few people (teachers) who have really done the business in terms of making me think, totally changing my views on life, inspiring me etc. and Johnny Offord was one of them.

There were a few others at St. John's but we can discuss them another time. I remember him as a Physics teacher who also taught us Culture.

Those of you who remember me as a schoolboy will remember I always had a scientific bent with a particular penchant for physics. John encouraged that. I remember going to him in the 4th form (at a point I was adolescent and losing the plot) having just discovered Schrödinger's equation but not understanding any of it. He had to go right back to elementary concepts of a mathematical function to explain it (I was a prat and way out of my depth) but the fact was he took an interest, didn't fob me off, but laboriously went through it a step at a time. Helen Waddell said that education was: "A miracle as new as the first crocus but its earth was the leaf drift of centuries". In the last week I have been lecturing the next generation of undergraduates on the concept of the 'scientific method'. Johnny is part of that leaf mould.

I don't know whether it is as important or more important, but John also taught me about culture and dignity. He was not a one dimensional physics teacher. Thank you for reminding us of his production of "The Long and the Short and the Tall". I remember it well even though it was nearly 40 years ago! His love of opera, his passion for theatre, but more importantly his bearing, the way he held himself, the manner in which he spoke.

What more can I say.

Jack Pike

(Head boy 1933) died on Tuesday 16th January in Telford Hospital of an embolism after a hip operation at the age of 92.

Jack took over as head boy from Ray Coomber when Ray left the College to enter the Brothers' novitiate. Ray eventaually became Brother Caedmon FSC. Jack entered the civil service. Customs & Excise after leaving school. Apart from wartime military service in the intelligence corps, served mainly in the Middle East, he stayed with te Customs & Excise until the mid-seventies. At first he worked in Southampton, and then later he returned to his beloved Portsmouth where he worked in the VAT office and lived in Southsea near thel Strand. Jack was married to an ex-Convent of the Cross girl, Ettorina Stasi, (Etta) in 1937. Several of the boys of Jack's generation ended up married to airls of the Convent of the Cross which was then situated at the top of Grove road North, not far from St. John's. They had one son, Michael who is a retired major of the Royal Army Service Corps. As Jack and Etta got older, they decided to move to be near their son in Telford. Etta died in July 2004. Jack had other family connections with the College as his brother. Earnie was also a scholar and played for the 1937 first XI football team. Also his nephew. Stephen Lippett was at the College between 1972 and 1976. In addition his wife. Etta was the cousin of Val Fontana.

Jack was a lifetime supporter of Portsmouth F.C. and persuaded his son Michael that, in spite of living in Southampton, he should also support Pompey, and still does.



College News



The start of term was overshadowed by the sad news of the sudden death of a Year 9 student over the Christmas break. Pupils and staff were deeply saddened to hear how this young member of our community suffered what was believed to be a severe allergic reaction just a few days before the end of the holiday. Prayers were offered at the start of term assembly, a book of condolence was opened and a service of commemoration and thanksgiving for the life of Karim Oughton will be held in school after half-term. May he rest in peace.

The usual rhythm of the academic year resumed for Sixth Formers with the January session of AS and A2 exams. Year 11 pupils – having had time to reflect on their mock examinations – have all been interviewed individually by the Headmaster regarding their plans and aspirations. They now begin the final 'run in' to their final assessments. On Saturday 20th, almost 90 applicants for Year 7 entry in September sat the College entrance assessment in the New Benildus Hall. Recruitment remains healthy.

The boarding community at St John's is really thriving in all respects. Worthy of particular mention are their weekly services on Thursday evenings. These are an increasingly important element in the spiritual life and routine of the College. Led by various staff members, assisted by pupils of all ages, these services are varied and lively – and really 'speak to the condition' of the young people. They are also attended by a number of day pupils and teaching staff. The weekend events programme for boarders this term will include trips to Brighton, Hampton Court and the Submarine Museum.

Term will end on Friday 23rd March with our annual Lenten Service – to be held in the Sports Hall. As always, any OJs wishing to attend will be very welcome. Please let us know in advance.
